Breakdown of the 2024 Survey

The Survey Said ...

In Autumn 2024 we sent a survey to all households in St Erme; we wanted to know what you thought would help you and your family improve their health and wellbeing.

What We Learned:

Most respondents knew what groups and activities are available.

People appreciate what is available and the work of the volunteers involved.

There is demand for more; there are gaps in provision.

What respondents would like for St Erme:

- Walking group
- Toddler/parent group
- Youth group
- Social facilities cafe, pub, social club
- Art and music groups
- General fitness groups
- Family Hub guidance, advice, general meet up
- Local access to health care (vaccinations, blood pressure checks etc)
- Local access to CAB (advice including housing, finance etc)

Breakdown of the 2024 Survey

General Comments:

Too much reliance on technology to apply for benefits, contact health and other services, find out what is available etc.

Difficulty for some to access Truro Health Park, including parking. Need for easier, local access to healthcare – hospital, GP, dentist, podiatrist.

Moving Forward:

We are working to increase what is available in St Erme.

Funding is being sought to set-up and try new groups and activities.

We are working to ensure that the community knows what is available, when, and where.

We are promoting opportunities for volunteering.

St Erme Community Enhancement Group

Summary of the Group/What We Do?

The St Erme Community Enhancement Group works to improve our environment and the lives of the residents. We believe that small changes make a big difference.

Our ongoing projects include the Community Garden, bulb planting, maintaining flowerbeds, litter picking, book and information exchange, annual garden competition, and raising awareness of how to protect the environment.

We can only achieve this by working with other community organisations, and the help of volunteers who share their skills, knowledge and time.

Short History:

We were set up in 2005 following public consultation by St Erme Parish Council on the Parish Plan. One of the key comments from the population of St Erme was that the village needed to be brightened up. Our initial projects included: painting the bus stops, map of the village and road signage. The Best Kept Garden Competition, bulb planting and village noticeboards quickly followed. Since then, we have organised Jubilee and Coronation events,



Big Lunches, barrier painting, tree planting and litter picks. In 2024 the Enhancement and Climate
Adaption Groups merged – it had become clear that more of our aims and work were overlapping.

How Often We Meet:

The Enhancement Group meets as a committee about six times a year, but activities such as litter picks, 'Now We're Cooking,' sale of compost, happen at various times of the year. Details of all we do can be found on Facebook. The Community Garden team are at the garden regularly – see separate entry.

Meetings are held at the Community Centre; the Community Garden is based here too. Other activities happen across the parish.

St. Hermes Church, St. Erme

Parish Church - Church of England

Short History:

The church building dates from medieval times and was re-ordered in the 1820s and 1906. It is part of the Upper Fal Parishes which is made up of: Probus, Ladock (and Grampound Road), St. Erme, Tresillian and Lamorran with Merther, St. Michael Penkivel and Grampound with Creed.

How Often We Meet:

The usual worship time is 9.30am on Sundays. Where there are five Sundays in a month there is usually a service for the whole Benefice, in one of the eight churches.

Who the group activities are for? Everyone Various activities are arranged when circumstances permit. The most established one is a series of Lent Lunches held in the Village Hall on Wednesdays during Lent. Everyone is welcome.

The Church has six bells which can sometimes be heard ringing from local ringers or visiting teams.

We are a village cricket club that is very proud to say that we are truly open and welcoming to all, with opportunities across all ages, sexes and abilities. A club should not be



measured purely in what it does on the pitch but what it brings to the local community. We wish to give opportunities to all our members to help them achieve their own personal goals both on and off the pitch. The club's

foundation blocks, and relative success has been due to the emphasis on developing our youth section over the last 27 years, where we have given and will continue to give our young players every opportunity to play cricket at whatever level they can achieve. Any child aged 5 or over is very welcome on a Friday night.





St Erme Cricket Club

We run junior teams at Under 11 (x2), Under 13 (x2) under 15 (x2-mixed team and girls only team) and under 19s.

In the past few years, we have also made available the opportunity for all disabled cricketers to enjoy cricket on a Friday night.

We run 3 teams on a Saturday with our first eleven in Cornwall County One, seconds in Division 4 West and thirds in Division 7 Central. We also have an evening league team which plays on a Wednesday.

We were established in 1977, when we initially played friendly matches but joined the Cornwall Cricket League in 1993. Our junior section was formed in 1998, playing our first junior league game in 1999.



We meet for Junior coaching during the summer every Friday from 6.30pm to 8pm. Saturday/Sunday matches from 1pm with various junior and senior matches through the week. Something is happening at the ground most days in the summer. In the winter we train indoors in Truro.

St Erme Horticultural Society

The Society committee plans and stages the Annual Village Show, held in the Community Centre, on the second Saturday in August each year. Exhibitors are able to show their cookery, art, handicrafts, floral art, photography, vegetables, flowers, plants, and children's work.



The Society committee is now in the process of planning the 94th Show, although the show was part of the village life more than 94 years ago, with war time and global pandemics causing some missed years.

The show has evolved over the years, originally held in the village hall, then held simultaneously across two venues (the village hall and school), and then being moved to its current location at the Community Centre, with its improved accessibility, facilities and parking provision.

We meet two evenings a year for planning. One of the evenings is in November (AGM) when we discuss ideas for new classes, judges and show openers, and an evening in June when we discuss plans for the smooth running of the

show.

History

The Parish of St Erme is named after St Hermes who was beheaded in Rome on 28th August 132 A.D. The Parish of St. Erme was taxed in the Doomsday Roll in 1087A.D. The church tower and font are believed to be 750 years old, but the church itself was built in 1500's. The Methodist Church was built in 1846 and the first school in 1878.

St Erme is a rural parish which is located four miles north of the City of Truro. The village has an active community and is set in a rural landscape, almost entirely of agricultural use. Within the Parish of St Erme sits Trispen village and Churchtown; which is the area around St Hermes Church.



What we do

A parish council is a local authority that makes decisions on behalf of the people in the parish and has an overall responsibility for the well-being of its local community. Its work falls into three main categories which are representing the local community, delivering services to meet local needs and striving to improve quality of life in the parish. St Erme Parish Council has seven Councillors and employs a Clerk/RFO and a maintenance person.



We have three committees, the St Erme Community Emergency Plan Committee, The Health & Wellbeing Working Group and the St Erme Neighbourhood Priority Statement Working Committee.

Grass Maintenance

We work in partnership with Cornwall Council to carry out the grass maintenance of an area within the village of Tripsen Hill and have chosen to maintain the grass verges along the full length of Trispen Hill at a higher level. This is carried out by a contractor on our behalf. The areas at Eglos Road, Killigrew Gardens, Polglase Walk, Trevella Vean, Polisken Way, Tower Road and Chancery Close are maintained by Cornwall Council.

Weed Removal

Cornwall Council does not have a statutory duty to carry out weed removal and does not now do this. As a Parish Council we have chosen to carry out this service ourselves and treat all the areas within the 20mph speed limit. This is carried out by a contractor on our behalf twice a year.

Environment Officer

We work in partnership with Probus Parish Council and have an Environment Enforcement Officer that visits the Parish who can issue fixed penalty notices for dog fouling, littering and flyposting.

Public Rights of Way (PROWS)

St Erme Parish Council works in partnership with Cornwall Council to maintain the Public Rights of Way in our Parish. This is carried out by a contractor on our behalf.



St Erme Community Speed Watch

We oversee the community speed watch in St Erme and the interactive speed signs within the village.



Play Equipment

St Erme Parish Council owns and is responsible for the play equipment at the school park and the outside gym and toddler equipment at the Trispen football field.

Defibrillator

There is a public defibrillator on the wall outside of Trispen Post Office and Stores. We own and oversee the maintenance of this. There are two further public defibrillators one at the St Erme Village Hall and the other at the St Erme Community Centre. These are managed by the halls themselves.



Parish Noticeboards

We have five parish noticeboards around the village with



details on how to contact the Council and advertising community events and local consultations as well as important local information.

Planted Tubs

We own and are responsible for the two planted tubs by the noticeboard on Trispen Hill, which are maintained by volunteers.



Seating

St Erme Parish Council own and are responsible for the seat at the bottom of Eglos Road, Trispen Hill, the picnic bench in the school playing field and the bench at Tregassow Lane.

Church Green

The Church Green is owned and maintained by the Parish Council.

Planning

One of the council's responsibilities is its role as a 'statutory consultee' in the planning process. St Erme Parish Council takes great care to consider each planning application on its own merits and looks at the nature of the proposal and its potential effects on the surrounding area.

When Do we meet

Members of the Council usually meet on the first Tuesday of the month at the St Erme Community Centre at 7.30pm (apart from August). Members of the public are welcome to attend and speak during public participation.

What We Do?

We are a registered charity which manage community facilities such as Trencreek Playing Park, St Erme Community Centre, Cricket Pitch, and Football Pitch. The Trust exists to facilitate recreation in the community.





In addition, we open the Bar and Kitchen regularly, run a Community Larder, provide community events such as Bingos, Bonfire Night, and youth projects, and provide a venue for hire for parties, weddings, and corporate events.

We set up the village's Christmas lights display.





Short History: The original Trust was set up in 1984 with one field at Trencreek, part of this field was sold in 2002 and Trencreek Park was developed in 2004. The Trust purchased the Football Pitch on behalf of Football Clubs and rented the Cricket Field for St Erme Cricket Club.



Between 2007 to 2011 the Community Centre was built on land donated by The Rt Honourable Mary Verney.

In 2020 St Erme Playing Field Trust purchased the Cricket Field for St Erme Cricket Club to secure its future.

What we do?

We run a Community Larder from the Community Centre.

"Helping to reduce food waste going to landfill"

Volunteers collect surplus foods which have been donated from wholesalers and supermarkets that would otherwise be sent to land fill. This is supported through Neighbourly. We receive a weekly delivery from Fareshare Southwest for which we pay a nominal amount. Fresh fruit and vegetables are provided from the St Erme Community Garden which is run on site by the St Erme Community Enhancement Group.

When are we open:

Monday's 1.00pm to 2.30pm and 4.30pm to 6.00pm. The larder is open to everyone in the St Erme Parish area and is located around the back of the building at the double doors at the very far end.

What we do:

History of the group;

The group started in its current basic format 30 years ago but we believe there had been a similar group for many years before that.
